

## DEPARTMENT 15 – FLOWERS AND HOUSE PLANTS

Exhibits may be brought in on Wednesday between 10 am and noon which may help them be more fresh for judging.  
Exhibits may also be brought in on Tuesday between noon and 6 PM.

### RULES GOVERNING EXHIBITS

1. The exhibitor must grow all horticulture entries.
2. The exhibitors are to furnish their own clear glass display containers suitable to display the entry. Containers are not judged in specimen lots.
3. Each exhibitor is requested to bring all exhibits sorted and counted. A list of entries with class and lot numbers should be given to the clerk when entering.
4. Where the premium list specifies the number of stems or blooms, exactly that number must be used, no more, no less.
5. In case there is but one entry under any lot number, judges may award first, second, third, fourth, or no premium according to the merit of the entry.
6. Containers are to be picked up from 5-6 PM on Sunday.
7. No entry fee is charged in this department.
8. An exhibitor may enter once in each lot number.
9. All specimens must be properly named, if possible. Preference will be given to named specimens.
10. Flowers should be cut with adequate stem length for proper display.
11. Proper precautions will be taken to guard against accidents or loss, but in no case will this department or the fair be responsible for loss or accident from any cause.

### DEFINITION OF TERMS

- SPIKE – flower structure with flowers stemless on a common stalk
- SPRAY – portions of plants with a number of flowers on one stem
- STALK – a stiff stem which may or may not branch with one or more flowers on a stem
- STEM – solitary bloom, with leaves (may have more than one bloom on a stem – marigolds, petunias)

### CLASS I – POTTED PLANTS

Rules governing potted plants:

1. Plants should be free of insects and disease.
2. Plants should be in possession of the exhibitor at least 3 months and 6 months for cacti.
3. Plants should be well groomed, no seedpods, no spent blossoms, no damaged or unclean foliage, and no broken stems. The container should be clean and in good proportion to the size of the plant. The exhibitor should provide saucers.
4. Specimens should be properly named, if possible. Preference will be given to named specimens.
5. African violets must have only one crown.
6. Plants are to be free standing. Hanging specimens can only be entered in designated lots.
7. Hanging plants must have secure hangers and an S hook so they may be hung.
8. Exhibitor may enter only one item per lot number.

## CLASS J - ARRANGEMENT

Rules governing artistic arrangement:

1. Arrangements are to be composed predominantly of fresh cut plant material, but may also include a dried branch, root, or product of previous years. Accessories and foliage are permitted in every exhibit.
2. Arrangement will be limited to 24" in width. There is no vertical limit.
3. Exhibitor need not grow material used.
4. Fresh material should be conditioned so it will remain fresh as long as possible. The exhibitor is responsible to make arrangements to replace wilted material.
5. No artificial flowers, fruits, or foliage permitted.
6. Exhibitor may enter only one item per lot number.
7. All articles exhibited must have been made by the exhibitor and finished during the year, and not having been previously exhibited at this fair.
